On Monday 6th June 2016, students from 47 schools were awarded international awards for their commitment in ensuring a good quality of life in their respective school communities. The ceremony was presided over by Her Excellency, Marie-Louise Coleiro Preca, President of Malta, at the Palace of the President, Valletta. 36 more schools can now proudly fly



the EkoSkola Green Flag on their school buildings. These, and all the other Green Flag schools hold international certification that they are actively integrating ESD in their school community. Moreover, ten schools also received an international recognition for distinguishing themselves in the Learning about Forests programme (LEAF). Fresh from hosting this





year's international LEAF National Operators' meeting, Nature Trust Malta once again, gave due credit to the interesting LEAF projects during this special ceremony.

Sub-themes that will be covered include overconsumption, food waste, local food and seasonality, processed food and palm oil, reducing meat consumption and food diversity. The YRE awards ceremony was held on the 3rd June 2016 at Maria Regina College, Mosta Secondary. A total of 127 projects, conducted by 184 students, were awarded certificates and prizes presented by the local sponsors. The two international winners were also announced on the day – 2nd place for 2 photos. Present for the occasion were representatives from WasteServ, HSBC Water Programme, We Eat Responsibly and the Parliamentary Secretary for Rights of Persons with Disability and Active Aging. Of particular highlight was the online presence of Dr Roberta Metsola, MEP, who will be sponsoring students and teachers to visit the EU Parliament and interview MEPs. EDIC Gozo held their own award ceremony, including YRE awards, on the 5th May 2016 at the Gozo Sports Complex, Victoria.



The 2016 Schools Sustainability Challenge

St Benedict College, Qrendi Primary School was shortlisted for the International Environmental TSL 2016 Schools Sustainability Challenge. It has been shortlisted as one



of the 10 finalists in recognition of its efforts through HSBC's, 'Catch the Drop' initiatives, in which the school narrates how rainwater is collected from the school's rooftops and used in the school's garden irrigation, as part environmental duties obligations. The Schools Sustainability Challenge recognises and rewards the sustainability action and leadership of schools around the world. The winning school is awarded the Schools Sustainability Challenge Trophy,

Gnien il-Generazzjonijiet at St Vincent de Paul Residence

As part of the European Day of Intergenerational Solidarity celebrations, on 29th April 2016, Hon Dr Justyne Caruana (Parliamentary Secretary for Rights of Persons with

Disability and Active Aging) inaugurated a botanical garden at the St Vincent de Paul Residence. Hon Caruana pointed out that this project is a living example how the environment can be improved through the collective and collaborative effort of the active citizenry of young and the elderly. Intergenerational solidarity is at the heart of a better quality of life. She also thanked the students, the Residence's staff, the artists, EkoSkola and Dinja Waħda for their part in the project.



As part of the inauguration ceremony, the Residence's administration reported on the actions taken to improve the sustainability at the St Vincent de Paul based on the feedback given by EkoSkola students during the audit they did of the premises on 19th February 2015. The innovations included: renovation of the wards based on water and energy saving practices; providing open spaces for relaxation; adopting a paperless policy; waste separation practices; and the use of cleaner fuels.



Meeting the Executive Chairman of Enemalta

As part of its preparation for the EkoSkola 6th Young People's Summit on Climate Change, the EkoSkola Committee of Maria Regina College, Mellieħa Primary School invited Eng. Fredrick Azzopardi (Executive Chairman, Enemalta plc.) to share his experience with them. He explained the reasons why climate change has increased

drastically in these past decades and focused on the environmental impact of electricity generation. also discussed measures which help control climate change such as generating electricity through cleaner sources encouraging more families and businesses to adopt renewable energy systems such as solar panels. He also stressed the importance of not wasting electricity by turning off lights,



computers and other electrical devices when they are not being used. Students were well prepared with challenging questions which Mr Azzopardi was glad to answer. The students then viewed videos about climate change and how it can be prevented.

(a) School-Community Link Project Grant Scheme: Promoting a zerowaste society



Your school will soon receive an application and information about a School-Community Link Project Grant Scheme jointly offered by Nature Trust Malta and WasteServ Malta Limited. The

scheme, called Promoting a zero-waste society, is intended to financially support schools wishing to initiate community-based projects aimed at reducing waste ... especially organic waste. Interested schools should fill in and send the application by not later than the **4th November 2016**. All applications will be evaluated by a jury. Ten proposals will be selected – each receiving a grant of €500 maximum. Preference will be given to projects focusing on reducing organic waste. More information is available on the memo that your school will be receiving shortly.

(b) European Week for Waste Reduction

For the 7th consecutive year, Malta is participating in the **European Week for Waste Reduction** - the 19th and 27th November. The theme for 2016 is **Packaging Waste**.

To participate develop waste reduction actions that address as wide an audience as possible. When planning your actions please ensure that what you are doing is not



inadvertently generating more waste! Try to go beyond simply organising oneoff clean-ups and invest in generating awareness and responsibility.

To register you need to complete a free online registration form accessible on www.ewwr.eu/en/register. You will need to include clear details of what you are going to organize or how you are

going to promote your efforts **during the scheduled week**. Registrations open in **September 2016**. These are the prizes:

- Best action related to reduce and reuse concepts in schools: Grant of €1000 for investment in school resources of benefit to the environment
- Best recycling action amongst all participating entities: Cash prize of €1000
- Best clean-up action amongst all participating entities: Cash prize of €1000

The same action may be competing with other European actions during the **European Waste Reduction Awards**!

(c) Outdoor Classroom Day

Anyone who has seen the effect of taking children outdoors to learn and play knows how powerful such experiences can be. Play is essential for children's healthy development, which means it is an essential part of every day. Learning outdoors, or 'learning by doing', creates lasting memories, helps build a greater awareness of the environment, provides more opportunities to think independently, and gets



children feeling challenged and excited by learning. The aim of the Outdoor Classroom Day is to get as many children as possible outside on **Thursday 6th October** for at least one lesson in the school day. (d) The Children's Climate Prize

The Nobel Prize is a very prestigious award that is annually awarded to grown-ups who have achieved important contributions or advances in the areas of physics, chemistry, physiology or medicine, literature and peace. The Children's Climate Prize is an award given to a child or group of children, aged 10-16, for exceptional work in the field of climate or environment. The winner will receive a medal, a diploma and 50,000 SEK (circa €5,400). The award ceremony takes place on 24th November 2016 – the anniversary of the 2015 Children's Climate Conference held in Södertälje, Sweden. During the conference, children from all over the world joined



forces to put pressure on the world leaders ahead of the climate summit in Paris, COP21.
