
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Editorial Note

GLOBE Meeting

Members of the GLOBE Program community in the Europe and Eurasia Region met for the Annual Regional Meeting in Italy, 21st-25th October 2019. Twenty countries were represented by 33 Country Coordinators and their Deputies, accompanied by trainers, scientists and teachers. The meeting included three days of training for GLOBE trainers and teachers.

Country representatives shared highlights from their countries and learned about GLOBE's most recent activities and worldwide preparations for the

25th anniversary of the program. Besides its Country Report, the Maltese delegation displayed information about 'The effects of trees on urban temperatures' – an investigation carried out by the Gozo College Middle School during the Exhibition Market of projects and activities. Attendees were impressed by the work and how successful schools in Malta were, particularly in linking the GLOBE Program with various



curricular subjects and other international programmes such as Eco-Schools and eTwinning. Ms Jessica Zahra, a link teacher at St Theresa College, Birkirkara Middle School, was also part of the Maltese delegation.

In Malta, GLOBE is being implemented in 31 schools. On Tuesday 29th October, H.E. Dr George Vella, President of Malta, presided over the Green Flag Award Ceremony at the San Ġorġ Preca College, Guardian Angel Secondary Education Resource Centre, Hamrun. 
Eco-Schools 25th Anniversary National Operators Meeting



This year's National Operators Meeting (NOM) celebrated the Eco-Schools 25th Anniversary in the country which hosted the first-ever Eco-Schools meeting – the Netherlands, at the bungalow park Landal Reeuwijk from 11-14 November. The main objectives of the meeting were to look at strategic planning for 2020-24, strengthen Eco-Schools' impact at a global scale, networking and capacity building, exploring opportunities within Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) and gaining a better understanding of the FEE EcoCampus programme, its implementation and potential. The meeting was attended by over 120 delegates from 60 different countries. Malta was represented by Vincent Attard (Executive President of Nature Trust - FEE Malta) and Prof Paul Pace (National Operator). Prof Pace was part of the jury reviewing the entries for the 25th Anniversary Lesson Plan Competition and conducted a workshop on Training Teachers for Lesson Planning.

Seminar for Eco-Schools Link Persons

Given the widespread popularity of EkoSkola, the number of new link persons involved in the programme and the number of new schools enrolled in the programme, Nature Trust - FEE Malta organised a seminar about EkoSkola and Education for Sustainable Development (ESD) on the 28th November 2019 at San Gorġ Preca College, Middle School, Blata I-Bajda. Besides information sessions about EkoSkola, attendees were shown how the programme can be used to integrate ESD through a whole school approach and how GLOBE could be integrated within it. The results and actions derived from the Link Persons Survey Report (distributed towards the end of the 2018-19 scholastic year) were shared and discussed with the 52 attendees, hailing from 41 different schools. These are some examples of the accomplishments that students and schools achieved last scholastic year. (The data was collected by the schools as part of the Monitoring and Evaluation of their Action Plan).



A golden learning opportunity for your students

The Berkeley Model United Nations (BMUN Malta) is a 4-day conference with international student-delegates representing countries from around the world in order to address topics of international concern and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). The conference is run on the United Nations Conference model and is open to **13-18 year** old students who are fluent in English.

BMUN Malta is a hands-on lesson in international relations, and focuses on developing skills such as diplomacy, public speaking, technical writing, research, and critical thinking. An
